Physical Characteristics

Area - 93 acres

Little Togus Pond is small and nearly circular, with excellent habitat to support warmwater fish species. The north end is very shallow with abundant aquatic vegetation providing good protection for young bass and perch. This area is also ideal for larger fish to lie-in-wait to ambush prey. This shallow marshy area is also good habitat for many waterfowl species.

Catching a brown trout on Little Togus Pond is rare, but the occasional trout will emigrate from Togus Pond, located just upstream. Anglers should concentrate their efforts on largemouth bass and white perch.

There is no public access on Little Togus Pond, but a small boat or canoe can be launched along the road. Extreme caution is advised considering the narrowness of this busy road.
