By providing this notice, Finzer does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Maine law, the applicability of the Maine data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On or about February 19, 2023, Finzer experienced a data security event that impacted its computer systems and caused a temporary disruption to services. Finzer promptly worked to secure its systems and, with the assistance of third-party cybersecurity specialists, commenced an investigation to confirm the nature and scope of the event. The investigation determined that an unknown threat actor accessed Finzer's network on or about February 8, 2023, Finzer was the victim of a sophisticated cyberattack, and an unauthorized actor may have accessed and/or acquired a limited amount of data stored on Finzer's systems. A thorough review of the affected data was subsequently performed to determine whether it contained any sensitive information and to identify potentially affected individuals. Finzer recently concluded this review.

The information that could have been subject to unauthorized access includes name and Social Security number.

Notice to Maine Resident

On or about February 8, 2024, Finzer provided written notice of this event to one (1) Maine resident. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, Finzer moved quickly to investigate and respond to the event, assess the security of Finzer systems, and identify potentially affected individuals. Further, Finzer notified federal law enforcement regarding the event. Finzer is also working to implement additional safeguards and training for its employees.

Additionally, Finzer is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, including advising individuals to report any suspected incidents of identity theft or fraud to their credit card company and/or bank. Finzer is providing individuals with information on how to place fraud alerts and credit freezes on their credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud. Finzer is providing written notice of this event to relevant state regulators, as necessary.

Finzer Roller, Inc. ("Finzer") is writing to inform you of an event that may impact your information. We are providing you with information about the event, our response, and steps you may take, should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

What Happened. On or about February 19, 2023, we identified unusual activity in our computer network. In response, we investigated the activity with assistance from third-party cybersecurity specialists to determine its nature and scope. The investigation determined that an unknown actor accessed our network from February 8, 2023 through February 19, 2023, and may have viewed or downloaded certain files without authorization. We conducted a comprehensive review of these files to identify the nature of the information in them and to whom that information related. Our review recently concluded.

What Information Was Involved. Our review indicated that your name and <<Breached elements>> were present in one or more of the files housed in the accessed network and among the files that may have been viewed or downloaded without authorization.

What We Are Doing. We take this event and the security of information in our care seriously. As part of our ongoing commitment to the privacy of information in our care, we implemented additional technical security measures to minimize the likelihood of a similar event in the future. We also are reviewing and enhancing existing policies and procedures and conducting additional workforce training to increase information security.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity. You may also review the information contained in the attached **Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Personal Information** section of this letter. Further, you may enroll in the complimentary credit monitoring and identity protection services we are offering to you for <<CM Duration>> months through Equifax. Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order your free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. You may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of your credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a one-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If you are a victim of identity theft, you are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should you wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any one of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on your credit report. To request a credit freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial, as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if you are a victim of identity theft.
