This notice will be supplemented with any new significant facts learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, Miller Valentine (“MV”) does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Maine law, the applicability of the Maine data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On or about July 28, 2021, MV became aware of suspicious activity on its computer network. Following this, MV promptly launched an investigation with the assistance of third-party forensic specialists to assess the security of its systems and determine the nature and scope of this incident. This investigation determined that data contained on certain aspects of MV’s network could have been subject to unauthorized access and/or acquisition on May 6, 2021, and thereafter between June 16, 2021 and July 28, 2021, but could not confirm which specific data actually was impacted. As a result, and in an abundance of caution, MV then embarked on a comprehensive review of all data contained on the pertinent portions of MV’s network in order to determine the full scope of sensitive information potentially impacted. On December 8, 2021, MV completed this comprehensive review. Thereafter, MV worked to locate address information for the individuals requiring notice of this incident.

The information that could have been subject to unauthorized access includes name, and Social Security number.

Notice to Maine Resident

On or about February 10, 2022, MV provided written notice of this incident to all affected individuals, which includes 1 Maine resident. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, MV moved quickly to investigate and respond to the incident, assess the security of MV systems, and notify potentially affected individuals. MV is also working to implement additional safeguards and training to its employees. MV is providing access to credit monitoring services for 1 year, through Equifax, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, MV is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud. MV is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one’s credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

NOTICE OF <<VARIABLE HEADER>>

Miller Valentine (“MV”) is writing to inform you of an incident that could affect the security of some of your information. While we are unaware of any actual or attempted misuse of your information, we take this incident very seriously. This notice provides information about the incident, our response, and resources available to you to help protect your information from possible misuse, should you feel it necessary to do so.

What Happened? On or about July 28, 2021, MV became aware of suspicious activity on our computer network. Following this, we promptly launched an investigation with the assistance of third-party forensic specialists to assess the security of our systems and determine the nature and scope of this incident. This investigation determined that data contained on certain aspects of MV’s network could have been subject to unauthorized access and/or acquisition on May 6, 2021, and thereafter between June 16, 2021 and July 28, 2021, but could not confirm which specific data actually was impacted. As a result, and in an abundance of caution, MV then embarked on a comprehensive review of all data contained on the pertinent portions of MV’s network in order to determine the full scope of sensitive information potentially impacted. On December 8, 2021, MV completed this comprehensive review and confirmed that information related to you could have potentially been impacted by this event.

What Information Was Involved? Information present in the affected email accounts that were potentially subject to unauthorized access and/or acquisition includes your name and <<Breached Elements>>. While we have no reason to believe that any identity theft or unauthorized use of the affected information has occurred, we are making you aware of this incident in an abundance of caution.

What We Are Doing. Data privacy and security are among MV’s highest priorities, and there are extensive measures in place to protect information in our care. Upon discovery, MV promptly commenced an investigation with the assistance of third-party cyber security specialists to confirm the nature and scope of this incident. MV is providing notice of this incident to potentially impacted individuals and pertinent state and/or federal regulators. As part of MV’s ongoing commitment to the security of information, all policies and procedures are being reviewed and enhanced where possible, additional safeguards are being implemented, and workforce training is being conducted to reduce the likelihood of a similar event in the future. As an added precaution, we are also offering you complimentary access to <<12/24>> months of credit monitoring and identity theft restoration services, through TransUnion. You will need to enroll yourself in these services if you wish to do so, as we are not able to activate them on your behalf. Please review the instructions contained in the attached *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Information* for additional information on these services.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud, to review your account statements, explanation of benefits, and credit reports for suspicious activity. You may also review the enclosed *Steps You Can Take To Help Protect Your Information* for additional steps you may take and information on what you can do to better protect against the possibility of identity theft and fraud, should you feel it is appropriate to do so. We also encourage you to enroll in the complimentary credit monitoring services we are offering you.

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. You may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of your credit report.

¹ WebScan searches for your Social Security Number, up to 5 passport numbers, up to 6 bank account numbers, up to 6 credit/debit card numbers, up to 6 email addresses, and up to 10 medical ID numbers. WebScan searches thousands of Internet sites where consumers’ personal information is suspected of being bought and sold, and regularly adds new sites to the list of those it searches. However, the Internet addresses of these suspected Internet trading sites are not published and frequently change, so there is no guarantee that we are able to locate and search every possible Internet site where consumers’ personal information is at risk of being traded.

² The Automatic Fraud Alert feature is made available to consumers by Equifax Information Services LLC and fulfilled on its behalf by Equifax Consumer Services LLC.

³ Locking your Equifax credit report will prevent access to it by certain third parties. Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If you are a victim of identity theft, you are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should you wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any one of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on your credit report. To request a security freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if you are a victim of identity theft.
