By providing this notice, Michigan Catholic Conference (“MCC”) does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Maine law, the applicability of the Maine data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

MCC uses outside service providers for a variety of services. One such service provider, Paycor, Inc. (“Paycor”), was utilized for payroll or benefits services. Paycor relies on a software tool called MOVEit Transfer, developed by Progress Software, to send and receive personal information over the internet.

On November 30, 2023, Paycor informed MCC that data related to certain retirement benefits recipients, which Paycor received as part of the services it provided to MCC, was accessed without authorization. Upon learning of the access, MCC promptly launched an investigation and conducted a review of the data to determine the types of information present and to whom it related for purposes of providing notice. Although MCC has no evidence of any actual or attempted misuse of information, MCC is notifying individuals in an abundance of caution.

The information that could have been subject to unauthorized access includes name and Social Security number.

Notice to Maine Residents

On or about February 1, 2024, MCC provided written notice of this event to potentially affected individuals. This mailing includes notice to approximately four (4) Maine residents on behalf of MCC.

Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, MCC moved quickly to investigate and respond to the event and notify potentially affected individuals. MCC is providing access to credit monitoring services for one (1) year, through Experian, to individuals whose personal information was potentially impacted by this event, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, MCC is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, including advising individuals to report any suspected incidents of identity theft or fraud to their credit card company and/or bank. MCC is providing individuals with information on how to place fraud alerts and credit freezes on their credit files, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

Michigan Catholic Conference (“MCC”) writes to inform you, as a previous recipient of retirement benefits from the Michigan Catholic Conference Lay Employees’ Retirement Plan, of an event that may affect the security of some of your personal information. This letter provides details of the event, our response, and resources available to you to help protect your personal information from possible misuse, should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

What Happened. MCC uses outside service providers for a variety of services. One such service provider, Paycor, Inc. (“Paycor”), was utilized for payroll or benefits services. Paycor relies on a software tool called MOVEit Transfer, developed by Progress Software, to send and receive personal information over the internet. On November 30, 2023, Paycor informed MCC that data related to certain retirement benefits recipients, which Paycor received as part of the services it provided to MCC, was accessed without authorization. Upon learning of the access, MCC promptly launched an investigation and conducted a review of the data to determine the types of information present and to whom it related for purposes of providing notice.

What Information Was Involved. Paycor notified MCC that, as a result of the unauthorized access into the MOVEit Transfer server, your name and Social Security number were subject to unauthorized access. Although we are currently unaware of any actual or attempted misuse of your personal information, we are providing you with this notice out of an abundance of caution.

What We Are Doing. We take this event and the security of personal information in our care, and in our service providers care, very seriously. Upon learning of this event, we moved quickly to investigate and respond to the event and notify the affected individuals.

As an added precaution, we are providing you with access to **[Extra2]** months of credit monitoring and identity protection services provided by Experian. A description of services and instructions on how to enroll can be found within the enclosed *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Information*. Please note that you must complete the enrollment process yourself, as we are not permitted to enroll you in these services on your behalf.

What You Can Do. Please review the enclosed *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Information*, which contains information on what you can do to better protect against possible misuse of your information. We encourage you to remain vigilant against potential incidents of identity theft and fraud, to review your account statements, and to monitor your credit reports for suspicious activity. You will also find information on how to enroll in the credit monitoring services offered.

If you believe there was fraudulent use of your information as a result of this incident and would like to discuss how you may be able to resolve those issues, please reach out to an Experian agent. Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order your free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. You may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of your credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a one-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If you are a victim of identity theft, you are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should you wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any one of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on your credit report. To request a credit freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial, as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if you are a victim of identity theft.
