The investigation into this matter is ongoing, and this notice will be supplemented with any new significant facts learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, Backroads does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Maine law, the applicability of the Maine data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On or about October 2, 2020, Backroads became aware of suspicious activity within its computer network. Upon learning of this activity, Backroads immediately began an investigation and worked with third party forensic specialists to determine the nature and scope of the activity. Backroads took steps to secure the network. Through this investigation, Backroads determined that certain files were encrypted and inaccessible. On or about October 16, 2020, Backroads learned that certain files were accessible to unknown actors and removed from Backroads' environment prior to the encryption of Backroads systems.

Once the scope and nature of the suspicious activity were confirmed, Backroads immediately undertook a comprehensive review of the files to identify those whose personal information may have been accessible. This review was completed on October 30, 2020. The investigation confirmed that the following information related to personal information was stored within one of the impacted network devices and may have been accessible to the unknown actor: your name, date of birth, Social Security number, government issued ID, financial account information and health insurance information, if obtained through Backroads. The information was not the same for each individual who was impacted.

Notice to Maine Residents

On or about November 19, 2020, Backroads provided written notice of this incident to affected individuals, which includes eighteen (18) Maine residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, Backroads moved quickly to investigate and respond to the incident, assess the security of Backroads email accounts and relevant systems, and notify potentially affected individuals. Backroads is also working to implement additional safeguards and training to its employees.

While Backroads is not aware of any actual or attempted misuse of this information, Backroads is providing access to credit monitoring services for one (1) year, through Epiq, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, Backroads is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, including information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

RE: Notice of Data Breach

Backroads writes to inform you of a recent incident that may affect some of your personal information. While we are unaware of any actual or attempted misuse of your information, we want to provide you with information about the incident, our response, and steps you may take to better protect your personal information, should you feel it necessary to do so.

What Happened? On October 2, 2020, Backroads became aware of suspicious activity within its computer network. Backroads immediately began an investigation, working with external forensic specialists, to determine the nature and scope of the activity. Our investigation determined that certain files within our environment were encrypted and inaccessible. On October 16, 2020, we discovered that certain files had been accessible to unknown actors and that certain personal information was contained in these files. We recognize that it may feel like there was a delay between the initial incident and receiving this notification. From the moment we knew that files were accessible to the unknown actors, we have been working both internally to determine who could have been affected, as well as externally with appropriate authorities in each jurisdiction where we operate globally. Thank you for your understanding and patience while we worked through all the necessary details.

What Information Was Involved? Backroads has both legal authority and obligation to maintain personal information for its employees. The forensic investigation confirmed that the following information was stored within one of the impacted network devices and may have been accessible to unknown actors: your name, date of birth, Social Security number, government issued ID (passport or driver's license, if provided to Backroads), financial account information and health insurance information, if obtained through Backroads. While we cannot confirm which piece of your personal information might have been accessed, we are informing employees of the full scope of what could have been compromised due to its presence in impacted files.

What We Are Doing. The confidentiality, privacy, and security of personal information within our custody is among Backroads' highest priorities. In order to minimize the chance that latent malware could remain on Backroads systems, we are rebuilding our network from the ground up, and adding further security measures, to better protect against similar incidents in the future.

What You Can Do. Please review the enclosed *Steps You Can Take to Protect Personal Information*, which contains information on what you can do to better protect against possible misuse of your information.

As an added precaution, Backroads is offering you access to one year of credit monitoring and identity protection services through TransUnion's myTrueIdentity (provided by Epiq) at no cost to you. Details of this offer and instructions on how to enroll in the services are enclosed within this letter.

STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO PROTECT PERSONAL INFORMATION

Enroll in Credit Monitoring and Identity Restoration Services

As a safeguard, we have arranged for you to enroll, at no cost to you, in an online credit monitoring service (*myTrueIdentity*) for one year provided by TransUnion Interactive, a subsidiary of TransUnion[®], one of the three nationwide credit reporting companies.

How to Enroll: You can sign up online or via U.S. mail delivery

- To enroll in this service, go to the *myTrueIdentity* website at www.MyTrueIdentity.com and, in the space referenced as “Enter Activation Code,” enter the 12-letter Activation Code <<Insert Unique 12-letter Activation Code>> and follow the three steps to receive your credit monitoring service online within minutes.
- If you do not have access to the Internet and wish to enroll in a similar offline, paper-based credit monitoring service, via U.S. mail delivery, please call the TransUnion Fraud Response Services toll-free hotline at **1-855-288-5422**. When prompted, enter the six-digit telephone passcode <<Insert static six-digit Telephone Pass Code>> and follow the steps to enroll in the offline credit monitoring service, add an initial fraud alert to your credit file, or to speak to a TransUnion representative if you believe you may be a victim of identity theft.

You can sign up for the online or offline credit monitoring service anytime between now and <<Enrollment Deadline>>. Due to privacy laws, we cannot register you directly. Please note that credit monitoring services might not be available for individuals who do not have a credit file with TransUnion or an address in the United States (or its territories) and a valid Social Security number. Enrolling in this service will not affect your credit score.

Monitor Your Accounts

In addition to enrolling in the complimentary services detailed above, we encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud, to review your account statements and explanation of benefits, and to monitor your credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors. Under U.S. law you are entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus. To order your free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. You may also contact the three major credit bureaus directly to request a free copy of your credit report.

You have the right to place a “security freeze” on your credit report, which will prohibit a consumer reporting agency from releasing information in your credit report without your express authorization. The security freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a security freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a security freeze on your credit report. 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In order to request a security freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

1. Your full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. If you have moved in the past five (5) years, provide the addresses where you have lived over the prior five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, military identification, etc.); and
7. If you are a victim of identity theft, include a copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft.

As an alternative to a security freeze, you have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on your file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If you are a victim of identity theft, you are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years.
