Dear Attorney General Frey,

We represent UnitedLex Corporation (“UnitedLex”) with respect to a data security incident involving the potential exposure of certain personally identifiable information (“PII”) described in more detail below. UnitedLex, a data and professional services firm headquartered in Overland Park, KS, is committed to answering any questions you may have about the data security incident, its response, and steps taken to prevent a similar incident from occurring in the future.

1. Nature of security incident.

On March 6, 2023, UnitedLex discovered suspicious network activity that impacted a limited number of its systems. UnitedLex immediately implemented its incident response protocols and engaged cybersecurity experts to assist with determining what occurred and whether any personal information was compromised. The investigation found that an unauthorized actor gained access to the UnitedLex corporate environment and took some documents stored on the system. UnitedLex is in the process of reviewing the documents to identify any personal information. While this review is not yet complete, UnitedLex is sending letters to current and former employees as some HR information may have been contained in the impacted documents. These documents may contain names and some combination of the following: addresses, Social Security numbers, financial account numbers for payroll purposes, and limited benefits information.

2. Number of residents affected.

Four (4) Maine residents were notified of the incident. A letter was sent to the potentially affected individuals on July 12, 2023. A copy of the template notification letter is enclosed.

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3. Steps taken in response to the incident.


Since this incident, UnitedLex changed all passwords, deployed additional 24/7 system monitoring, and conducted a thorough investigation. Additionally, impacted individuals were offered 12 months of credit monitoring and identity protection services through Kroll.

In early May, out of an abundance of caution, we arranged for 24 months of credit monitoring and identity protections services through IDX at no cost to you. We have arranged for you to receive credit monitoring and identity protection services offered by Kroll at no cost to you for 24 months, which you can sign up for even if you already registered and enrolled in the IDX services. Kroll is a global leader in risk mitigation and response, and their team has extensive experience helping people who have sustained an unintentional exposure of confidential data.

A security freeze is intended to prevent credit, loans and services from being approved in your name without your consent. To place a security freeze on your credit report, you may use an online process, an automated telephone line, or submit a written request to any of the three credit reporting agencies listed above. The following information must be included when requesting a security freeze (note that, if you are requesting a credit report for your spouse, this information must be provided for him/her as well): (1) full name, with middle initial and any suffixes; (2) Social Security number; (3) date of birth; (4) current address and any previous addresses for the past 5 years; and (5) any applicable incident report or complaint with a law enforcement agency or the Registry of Motor Vehicles. The request must also include a copy of a government-issued identification card and a copy of a recent utility bill or bank or insurance statement. It is essential that each copy be legible, and display your name, current mailing address, and the date of issue.
