The investigation into this matter is ongoing, and this notice will be supplemented with any new significant facts learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, Nelnet does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Maine law, the applicability of the Maine data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On January 19, 2022, Nelnet became aware an unauthorized individual was able to gain access to the third-party reporting application that maintains university clients' student and authorized payer data in the TMS platform. Nelnet's cybersecurity team took immediate action to disable the credentials used on January 19, 2022 and launched an investigation with third-party forensic specialists to determine the nature and scope of the activity. On January 21, 2022, this investigation determined that certain reports containing student and authorized payer information were downloaded by an unauthorized individual between January 17, 2022, and January 19, 2022. The information impacted includes name, address, Social Security number, and student ID.

Notice to Maine Residents

On or about February 18, 2022, Nelnet provided written notice of this incident to affected individuals, which includes approximately twelve (12) Maine residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*. Nelnet's investigation into this incident is ongoing and this notice may be supplemented if it is determined that a significant number of additional Maine residents were impacted.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, Nelnet moved quickly to investigate and respond to the incident, assess the security of Nelnet systems, and notify potentially affected individuals. Nelnet is also working to implement additional safeguards and training to its employees. Nelnet is providing access to credit monitoring services for two (2) years, through Experian IdentityWorks, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, Nelnet is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, including advising individuals to report any suspected incidents of identity theft or fraud to their credit card company and/or bank. Nelnet is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit file the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

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Re: Notice of Security Incident

Nelnet Campus Commerce (“Nelnet”) is writing to make you aware of an incident that may affect the security of some of your information. Nelnet operates the Tuition Management System (“TMS”) platform utilized by Virginia State University to assist in the processing of tuition payments. While we are not aware of any actual or attempted misuse of your information, we are providing you with an overview of the incident, our ongoing response, and resources available to you right now to help protect your information, should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

What happened? On January 19, 2022, Nelnet Campus Commerce became aware an unauthorized individual was able to gain access to the third-party reporting application that maintains university clients’ student and authorized payer data in the TMS platform. Nelnet’s cybersecurity team took immediate action to disable the credentials used on January 19, 2022 and launched an investigation with third-party forensic specialists to determine the nature and scope of the activity. On January 21, 2022, this investigation determined that certain reports containing student and authorized payer information were downloaded by an unauthorized individual between January 17, 2022, and January 19, 2022.

What information was involved? Specifically, the potentially impacted data contained your name, [REDACTED]. There is no indication this information has been or will be used inappropriately. The investigation found no evidence of payment information being compromised such as bank accounts or credit card numbers.

What are we doing? The confidentiality, privacy, and security of student information in our care is one of our highest priorities. When we discovered this incident, our cybersecurity team secured the application and launched an investigation to determine what data might be at risk. Following these actions, we notified law enforcement and will cooperate with any investigation that occurs. We are notifying potentially impacted individuals, including you, so that you may take steps to best protect your information, should you feel it is appropriate to do so. As an added precaution, we are offering you immediate access to credit monitoring and identity theft protection services for 24 months at no cost to you, through Experian. You can find information on how to enroll in these services in the below *“Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Personal Information.”* We encourage you to enroll in these services, as we are not able to do so on your behalf.

What can you do? We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors over the next 12 to 24 months. Please also review the information contained in the enclosed *“Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Personal Information.”*

Enroll in Credit Monitoring

To help protect your identity, we are offering complimentary access to Experian IdentityWorksSM for **24 months**.

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order your free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. You may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of your credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If you are a victim of identity theft, you are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should you wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any one of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on your credit report. To request a security freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if you are a victim of identity theft.
