We represent Lyon Real Estate (“Lyon”) located at 3640 American River Drive, Suite 100, Sacramento, California 95864, and write to notify your office of an event that may affect the security of certain personal information relating to two (2) Maine residents. This notice may be supplemented if significant new facts are learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, Lyon does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Maine law, the applicability of the Maine data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On or around May 4, 2023, Lyon identified suspicious activity related to its servers and systems within its main office building in Sacramento, California. Lyon immediately launched an investigation into the nature and scope of the event with the assistance of third-party subject matter specialists. Through the investigation, Lyon learned that an unknown individual accessed its systems via a software vulnerability in a vendor application program used by Lyon. The unauthorized access occurred at various times between April 18, 2023 and May 4, 2023, and the unauthorized actor obtained certain information stored in Lyon’s systems.

In an abundance of caution, Lyon worked with specialists to undertake a comprehensive review of information stored in the impacted files to determine what information was affected and to whom the information related. Lyon then conducted a manual review of its records to confirm the identities of individuals affected by this event and their contact information to provide notifications. This review was recently completed.

The information that could have been subject to unauthorized access related to Maine residents may vary by individual but includes name, medical information, health insurance information, Social Security number, and financial information.

Notice to Maine Residents

On or about September 6, 2023, Lyon began providing written notice of this event to potentially affected individuals, including two (2) Maine residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached hereto as *Exhibit A*.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon becoming aware of the event, Lyon moved quickly to investigate and respond, assess the security of its systems, and identify potentially affected individuals. Further, Lyon promptly reported the event to federal law enforcement. Lyon is also working to implement additional safeguards and training to its employees. Lyon is providing access to credit monitoring services for one (1) year, through Equifax, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, Lyon is providing potentially affected individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, including advising individuals to report any suspected incidents of identity theft or fraud to their credit card company and/or bank. Lyon is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one’s credit file,

the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state attorney general, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

Lyon is providing written notice of this event to appropriate state regulators and to the three major consumer reporting agencies, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion.

NOTICE OF <<SECURITY INCIDENT/DATA BREACH>>

Lyon Real Estate (“Lyon”) is providing notice of an event that may affect some of your information. Although we have no indication that your information has been fraudulently misused in relation to this event, we are providing you with information about the event, our response, and additional measures you can take to help protect your information, should you feel it appropriate to do so.

What Happened? On or around May 4, 2023, Lyon identified suspicious activity related to its servers and systems within its main office building in Sacramento, California. We immediately launched an investigation into the nature and scope of the event with the assistance of third-party subject matter specialists. Through our investigation, we learned that an unknown individual accessed Lyon’s systems via a software vulnerability in a vendor application program used by Lyon. The unauthorized access occurred at various times between April 18, 2023 and May 4, 2023, and the unknown individual obtained certain information stored in Lyon’s systems.

In an abundance of caution, we worked with specialists to undertake a comprehensive review of information stored in the impacted files to determine what information was affected and to whom the information related. We then conducted a manual review of our records to confirm the identities of individuals affected by this event and their contact information to provide notifications. This review was recently completed.

What Information Was Involved? Our investigation determined that the following types of information related to you were present in the involved files at the time of the event: name and <<Data Elements>>.

What We Are Doing. We take this event and the security of information in our care seriously. Upon discovering this event, we promptly took steps to investigate and respond, assess the security of our systems, and notify potentially affected individuals. In response to this event, we are reviewing and enhancing our information security policies and procedures, which includes procedures with respect to the integration and use of third-party software products.

While we are unaware of any fraudulent misuse of your information as a result of this event, as an additional precaution, Lyon is offering you access to <<12/24>> months of complimentary credit monitoring and identity restoration services through Equifax. Details of this offer and instructions on how to activate these services are enclosed with this letter.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and explanation of benefits under your health insurance, and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors.

Additional resources can be found below in the *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Personal Information*. You may also enroll in the complimentary credit monitoring services being offered.

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order a free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. Consumers may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of their credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If consumers are the victim of identity theft, they are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should consumers wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in a consumer’s name without consent. However, consumers should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in their credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application they make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, consumers cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on their credit report. To request a credit freeze, individuals may need to provide some or all of the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if they are a victim of identity theft.

Additional Information

Consumers may further educate themselves regarding identity theft, fraud alerts, credit freezes, and the steps they can take to protect your personal information by contacting the consumer reporting bureaus, the Federal Trade Commission, or their state Attorney General. Please note that in order to file a report with law enforcement for identity theft, consumers will likely need to provide some proof that they have been

a victim. Instances of known or suspected identity theft should also be reported to law enforcement and the relevant state Attorney General. This notice has not been delayed by law enforcement.

For New Mexico residents, consumers have rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, such as the right to be told if information in their credit file has been used against them, the right to know what is in their credit file, the right to ask for their credit score, and the right to dispute incomplete or inaccurate information. Further, pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, the consumer reporting bureaus must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information; consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information; access to consumers' files is limited; consumers must give consent for credit reports to be provided to employers; consumers may limit "prescreened" offers of credit and insurance based on information in their credit report; and consumers may seek damages from violators. Consumers may have additional rights under the Fair Credit Reporting Act not summarized here.
