Most vacancies are posted for a minimum of 10 business days on our Careers website, which is searchable by category or agency and updated frequently. All agency postings are listed on the State Jobs page.

Minimum qualifications are established for each job title by the Bureau of Human Resources in conjunction with the employing agencies. Applicants must meet the minimum qualifications for the position they are applying for to be considered for an interview. Human Resources will screen applications to ensure they meet these requirements, therefore, it is imperative that applications be complete and accurate.

Who will you offer an interview?

With this activity, put yourself in HR's shoes. Who meets the minimum qualifications for the job? What other information might you need? Review the qualifications below and consider what you would do.

Example: Minimum qualifications for finance related careers: bachelor's or master's degree in related field or 5+ years of work experience in the field. Ability to use independent judgment, initiative, and discretion to make decisions on varied matters.

Applicant 1: 8 years of experience in accounting Worked independently, requiring initiative and immense decision making skills. **Applicant 2:** Masters in Finance 15 years of work experience in accounting, as senior lead for 2 Good communication and leadership skills **Applicant 3: Associate Degree in Business** 10 years of work experience in accounting with 7 years in senior management Stong organizational skills, strategic decisionmaking skills, and strong written and verbal communication.

All of these candidates are qualified for this position, and could be sent from you, their HR professional to the hiring manager for review. The hiring manager will then determine which qualified applicants they will offer an interview. In Maine state government, HR must also pay attention to candidates who are minimally qualified Veterans, Gold Star Spouses, and individuals with a disability, as these candidates must be offered an interview.

Accommodation Creation



Many jobs in State Government are dedicated to helping remove barriers for individuals with disabilities. From roles in the Department of Labor, Health and Human Services, and more, a lot of help is available to make the aspects of life that are not accessible, accessible.

Step 1: Choose a need


Some examples might include: visual impairments or blindness, mobility needs, anxiety, PTSD, hard of hearing or deafness, medication needs and impacts, or any other examples that you can think of. The best choice may be one you are knowledgeable on, from personal experience, research, etc.

Step 2: Brainstorm creative accomodations for a job of your choice based on the need you've chosen.

Is someone unable to access the building they work in because there are only stairs? You could add a ramp! Are loud noises triggering for an employee? Noise cancelling headphones and private workspaces may make working possible for this employee. Remember, accommodations are never special treatment: they are making doing the work possible, and often benefit all employees.



The Bureau of Motor Vehicles works with all things drivers and vehicles, so part of their job includes vanity plates! Create a vanity license plate for a cause you care about, one that represents you or the state of Maine! Use the above examples as guidance, and don't forget to include "MAINE" and space for the license number.



Do you like working with technology or creating infastructure?

If so, you're in luck! All jobs in Maine State Government use or benefit from technology, but there are many positions where technology and infrastructure are a main part of the job duties. State Government couldn't operate without the teams that set up and build our office spaces, or keep our computers updated and running. The whole State is able to "get there from here" thanks to the State Employees who build bridges or plan roads. We also have State Employees who work with technology to make books and important documents accessible, such as the State Archives and the Maine State Library. These aren't typically the roles you first think of when considering a career in State Government, but they are incredibly important. Without State employees working in these positions, your life might look very different.






ENGINEERING CHALLENGE

CONSTRUCTION CHALLENGE: BUILD A BRIDGE



Materials:

Paper (preferably construction paper)
Books
Pennies or other small weights



Instructions:

Fold your first piece of construction paper into quarters, folding it the long way like an accordion. After that, take the second piece and fold it in half then turn that fold that into half as well, making quarters, but in a different way. On the second one, fold the edges up like a rail. You can also take more paper and build your own designs! Then, place the bridge between two books, and slowly beginning placing pennies on them. Observe: What happens with each design? Which can hold more weight? Which may last longer in wind? Which is easiest to make? What bridge do you think is best? Teach someone you know about what you found!

Policy can be anything from laws created by the legislature, executive orders from the governor, or organization wide rules. Some State policies have been in place for an extended period of time, and some may change while you're working in Maine State Government. Policy impacts everything we do, and every word within policy making must be carefully considered because of that. In these roles, something as simple as a one-word change in a policy can make a significant impact. If you love to work in spaces where no day is the same, these might be the roles for you.

Some State employees are at work every day to ensure the enforcement of policies and laws which protect the people of Maine. Whether your passions are in criminal justice, law, finance, business, or something else entirely, there's a job for you in State Government.



ECONOMIC GRAPHING ACTIVITY

Task: Calculate the Unemployment Rate from the number of individuals in the labor force and individuals who are unemployed. Next, plot the Unemployment and Inflation Rate on the graph below. The first one is done for you.

The Unemployment Rate is calculated by dividing the number of Unemployed individuals in an economy by the Labor Force (the number of employable adults). The Inflation Rate measures the average increase in the price of goods and services over one year

Calculating Compound Interest

- You invest \$188 at a rate of 3.4% per year for five years.
- You invest \$750 at a rate of2.4% per year for six years.

P = Principle or Amount Invested, R = Interest Rate, T = Time

My Budget

Departments have to plan their budgets in advance, to allocate funds for programming, personnel, operations, and more. Some departments, like the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations generate revenue. Other bureaus have a set budget each fiscal year through the general fund. 



The beetle on the left, is called the Asian Longhorned Beetle and it originated in Asia but has been found in states as close as Massachusetts. These beetles are wood borers, so if they were on Maine trees, they could damage the tree crown, and eventually kill the tree. If you think you see this beetle, you must report it to the Maine Forest Service, as preventing disease and invasive species spreading is part of their job! These beetles may try and trick you though, as they look similar to the white spotted sawyer on the right, which is native to Maine, Always better to report and let the professionals decide!

Air Quality Experiment



Objective

Identify particles in the air that are all around you, but often cannot see. Think about the importance of air quality and how it affects living things, including yourself.

Materials

- Paper/cardstock
- Ruler

- Scissors
- Clear tape
- String
- Hole punch
- Quarter (or something round)

Instructions

Make the Air Strip:

- 1. Cut out a piece of paper or cardstock that is 2-in. wide and 10-in. long,
- 2. Cut out 5 equal sized holes in the paper (use a quarter to trace out the circles).
- 3. Place a piece of clear tape over one side of the paper (make sure the holes are completely covered.
- 4. Punch a hole at the top of the paper and place the string through the hole Hang up the Air Strip:
 - 1. Using the string on the Air Strip, tie it up in an area where it will not bump into other objects (hang them up indoors and outside).
 - a. OPTIONAL: Make multiple Air Strips and put them in different locations.

Analyze the Results:

- 1. After a week collect the Air Strip(s) and analyze the particles found on the Air Strip and try to identify what they are.
- 2. What does this mean about the air quality in the location of the Air Strip?

Challenge Questions

- Compare the air strips from different locations. How does the air quality differ between these locations?
- What factors could have contributed to the particles found on the air strip?
 - Wind direction? Weather? Nearby roads and buildings?
