






MFS – Natural Resource Regulations

MFS Forest Policy & Management Division has authority over the following regulations:

- Chapter 20 Forest Practices Act
- Chapter 21 Statewide Standards for Timber Harvesting in Shoreland Areas (in Organized Towns) – "SWS"
- Chapter 23 Liquidation Harvesting
- Chapter 26 Forest Operations Notifications
- Chapter 27 Timber Harvesting in Unorganized/deorganized towns



Main points

- There are no changes coming to timber harvesting regulations in organized towns.
- There are no changes in the Chapter 21 Statewide Standards.
- Chapter 21 Statewide Standards will become effective in the unorganized territories ("UT") in January 2026.
- Chapter 27 will be modified before 2026 to remove overlap with Chapter 21.

A Brief History of SWS

- Before SWS (pre-2005)
 - Multiple rules & authorities for timber harvesting near water
 - Mandatory Municipal Shoreland Zoning Ordinances Town CEO
 - Local shoreland zoning maps
 - ❖ Natural Resource Protection Act (NRPA) DEP
 - Land Use Planning Commission rules LUPC (LURC)
 - MFS "assisted" other entities with enforcement with no direct authority
 - ❖ By MOU, MFS conducted site visits & referred enforcement to DEP/LUPC (agencies with limited staff/other responsibilities)
 - MFS referred municipal issues to local CEOs

1999-2005 Legislative Direction

- To develop a <u>single set of regulatory standards</u> for timber harvesting operations in shoreland areas,
- that apply throughout the state, and
- establish Maine Forest Service as the regulatory authority.

Goals: avoid overlapping jurisdictions, reduce confusion/complexity for the regulated community, streamline information & enforcement, improve compliance, and protect water resources

A multi-year, consensus-based rule-making process took place, with a broad range of stakeholders – forest products companies, harvesters, landowners, conservation interests, foresters, agencies.

The process since 2005:

- * DEP & LUPC delegated authorities to MFS in statute/rule.
- SWS rules were finalized.
- A local option (not mandated) for towns to adopt SWS (instead of SZ) for timber harvesting:
 - MFS takes on responsibility for timber harvesting only (Rangers, District Foresters, Regional Enforcement Coordinators)
 - No impact to other local regs (e.g. clearing for development)
 - Reduced costs/responsibility for towns local collaboration
- ❖ Since 2013 MFS Chapter 27 applies in unorganized towns


As of April 2024:

Chapter 21 – Applies in shoreland areas in some organized towns that HAVE adopted Statewide Standards (BLUE)

Chapter 27 – applies in shoreland/protected areas in all unorganized towns (YELLOW)

DEP Rules & Local Shoreland Zoning Ordinances apply in organized towns that have NOT adopted Statewide Standards (WHITE)

THE CHANGE: By Statute, SWS will take effect in <u>unorganized</u> townships – after a "critical mass" of <u>organized</u> towns have adopted SWS



Timeline – Beginning May 2024

- A "critical mass" of towns has adopted SWS DACF Commissioner notified the Secretary of State in May
- * By statute, SWS will go into effect in all unorganized towns
- Effective date is January 2, 2026 (one full calendar year after the year in which critical mass is reached)
- Municipalities that have adopted SWS will not change
- Towns that have not adopted SWS will NOT change
 - unless they choose to adopt SWS

2024-2026 Timeline

- Chapter 27 will be <u>revised</u> in 2024-2025 to remove redundancy with SWS
- Chapter 21 SWS will go into effect without revision or rulemaking in January 2026
 - The SWS rule maintains some differences between organized/unorganized, so standards will not be perfectly identical
- MFS will provide outreach and education to inform landowners, loggers, foresters, and others in 2024 & 2025.

Why are we doing this?

- Process in statute, rules in place; long-standing agreement
- Original objective a single set of standards is still valid
 - ❖ Better information, training, education; less room for confusion
 - Simpler rules in one location/from one source (MFS)
 - More accessible/usable SWS maps
 - Improved compliance & equitable enforcement
 - Improved protection of water quality
- Ch 21 similar to 27; increased protections in some areas
 - .g. nonforested wetlands, some streams

Recap & next steps

May - Commissioner's determination of critical mass 2024 August - Information to stakeholders, announcement - Workshops, webpage, background info, FAQs By January 2025 - Chapter 27 rulemaking/revision 2025 All year - education/outreach, map development, etc. SWS take effect in Unorganized Territories 2026 In rule: FONs submitted AND harvesting in progress before 2026 can continue under old (Chapter 27) rules.
