There is no formal definition in the Natural Resources Protection Act (NRPA) for a "common or shared recreational pier, dock, or wharf." It typically means a pier, dock, or wharf used by multiple people beyond the landowner and their immediate family. The application and review process for a shared pier is the same as that for a private pier, and there is no formal criteria for distinguishing the two. The project purpose (common vs. private) is only relevant to the review in the context of the alternatives analysis, as a justification for the project. A NRPA permit applies to the structures as shown on the approved plans. The permit is issued to the applicant and the Department does not typically dictate how the structures are subsequently used. Once a NRPA permit is issued, the applicant has four years to begin construction

of the project, and up to seven years to finish construction (from the date of approval).
