

This module introduces the five Wabanaki Nations, where they are in Maine and their languages.

- Lessons 5 & 6: Panawapskek (NUMBERS)
- **Lessons 7 & 8:** Peskotomuhkati (ANIMALS)
- Lessons 9 & 10: Wolistaqiyik (FOOD)
- Lessons 11 & 12: Abènaki (FAMILY)
- Lessons 13 & 14: Reflection and Book Creation
- Parts of this module could easily be integrated into current classroom units covering: numbers, colors, animals, food and family.
