Any transaction of \$1,000 or more must be reported within 24 hours during the 13 days preceding each election. Please see reverse for guidance on this requirement.

*SEMIANNUAL REPORTS FOR GUBERNATORIAL CANDIDATES IN THE 2026 ELECTIONS

Pre-Election Semiannual Reports: If a campaign becomes financially active before the start of the election cycle, it may have to file pre-election semiannual reports. If a campaign raises or spends more than \$1,000 by June 30, 2025, it will have to file both the 2025 July and 2026 January Semiannual Report. If a campaign raises or spends more than \$1,000 after June 30, 2025 and before December 31, 2025, it will have to file the 2026 January Semiannual Report. If a campaign does not go over the threshold amount of \$1,000 in 2025, the 42-Day Pre-Primary Report would be the first report filed and covers from the beginning of the campaign through April 21, 2026.

Post-Election Semiannual Reports: If a campaign has more than \$100 remaining in unspent cash or unpaid debts or loans after the final post-election report is filed, the campaign must file the next scheduled semiannual report. For candidates who were unsuccessful in the primary election, this would be the 2027 January Semiannual Report. For candidates who participated in the general election, this would be the 2027 July Semiannual Report. Semiannual reports due in July and January would continue to be filed by the campaign until all obligations are paid, and all unspent cash is disposed of, which must take place within four years of the election.

24-Hour Reports

WHEN TO FILE THE REPORT
Within 24 hours, including weekends and holidays, of receiving the contribution, making the expenditure,
incurring the obligation, or placing the order.

WHAT TO REPORT

Expenditures:

Any single expenditure of \$1,000 or more.

Orders placed with or obligations made to vendors for goods or services are considered expenditures at the time the obligations are made. Please refer to the Commission's Rules, Chapter 1, Section 7(3) for more information concerning events which constitute making an expenditure and the timing and reporting of these expenditures.

Contributions:

Any single contribution of \$1,000 or more. This includes contributions from the candidate or candidate spouse/domestic partner, and a single loan of \$1,000 or more.

Please note: For the purposes of filing a Primary Election 24-Hour Report, a contribution of \$1,000 or more for the general election is not required to be filed in the 24-hour reporting period prior to the primary.

- All transactions within a single twenty-four hour period can be collected on one 24-Hour Report. A best
 practice is to set aside a designated time every day during the thirteen days before the election to collect
 and report all transactions over \$1,000 on a single daily report.
- Any maximum contribution (\$1,950) will trigger the reporting requirement during a 24-hour reporting period.
- Any unpaid obligation of more than \$1,000 must be reported regardless of when the vendor is paid. This
 includes the placement of an order for goods and services; a promise or agreement that payment will be
 made; the signing of a contract for a good or a service; or the delivery of a good or a service even if
 payment has not been made.
- Overhead costs—such as rent, taxes, utilities, and some salary payments—are not required to be reported in a 24-Hour Report.
- Unenrolled candidates are required to file 24-Hour Reports for expenditures that meet the threshold during the 13 days preceding the primary, despite not having a primary election themselves.
- Any transactions that would meet the requirement for 24-Hour reporting that are not reported until the 42-Day Post election report will be subject to a late-filing penalty.

FILING PROCEDURES

Candidates must file reports electronically on the Commission's website. Candidates or treasurers must enter the required information and click "File Report" by 11:59 p.m. on the filing deadline. The deadline for filing a 24-hour report is no later than twenty-four hours after receiving the contribution or making the expenditure (as described on reverse).

Commission staff will be available until 5:00 p.m. on filing deadlines to offer assistance to candidates, treasures, and campaign staff.
