Through this project, Maine's 5 Area Agencies on Aging have made **over 1,000 outreach connections** with communities across Maine, including **over 250 in-person meetings**.

At Eastern Area Agency on Aging alone, the Community Ambassador, funded by Community Connections, has driven over 2,000 miles to connect with Age Friendly Communities, Community Members, Municipalities, and other organizations.

Maine's 5 Area Agencies on Aging

Maine's Area Agencies are a core part of the fabric of supports for older Mainers.

They provide information, direct services, and resources to older adults (60+), adults with disabilities, and their care partners.

Community Connections

AAA Impact

- Serving Maine's most vulnerable populations for over 50 years
- Served over 176,000 older adults and 1,870 family caregivers Oct 2022 -September 2023
- 1,450 volunteers serve nearly 100,000 volunteer hours annually
- Key services include:
 - Meals on Wheels & Social Dining Sites
 - Medicare Counseling
 - Weekly Phone Call Programs
 - MoneyMinders
 - Information & Referrals
 - Adult Day Centers
 - Caregiver Information and Support

Community Connections @ the AAAs

- → Hired 5 Community Ambassadors to conduct outreach
- → Staff trainings to increase skills and capacity statewide
- → Developed informational training and educational videos about the AAA services

Strong connections with communities is more important than ever:

- 52% of older Mainers who are single lack income to pay for basic needs
- 26% live alone
- 21% self-report "fair to poor health"

Partnerships & Service Connections

HIGHLIGHT 2:

Shared Learning & Collaboration

Community Ambassadors work closely together as a cross-AAA team.

42 AAA staff members registered for 5-part Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion training series to build stronger cultural competency at AAAs.

15 AAA staff attended a public speaking training to improve how the AAAs can more effectively spread information about their work.

Learnings & Recommendations

Recommendations

- → Leverage and value qualitative data to measure the impact
- → Continue the work beyond the pilot period
- → Support continued investment in resource navigation services and guides

Learnings

- → The need is great and this work is helping individuals and communities statewide
- → Difficult to measure the ripple effects of relationship-building (self-referrals)
- → Relationships and referral pipelines take time to build
- → Gaps in cohesive, current resource hub as a state



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Learnings




- Importance of human interaction and word of mouth
