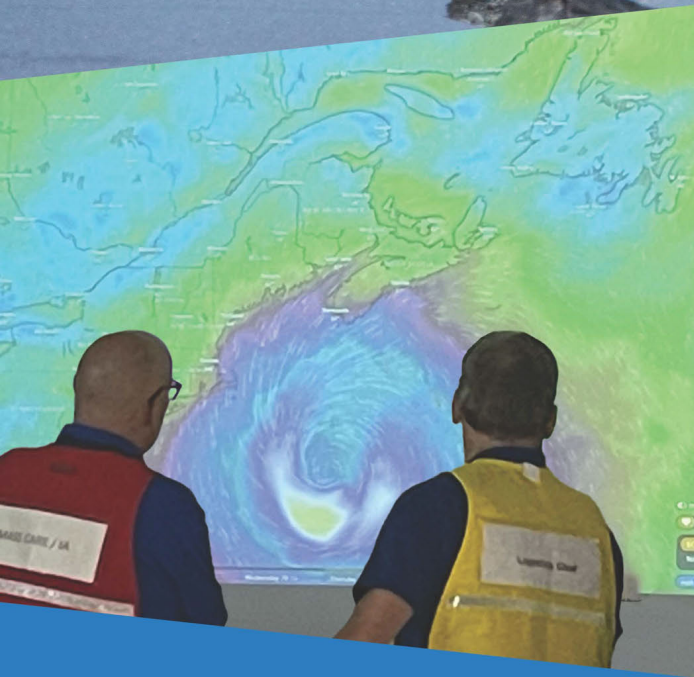
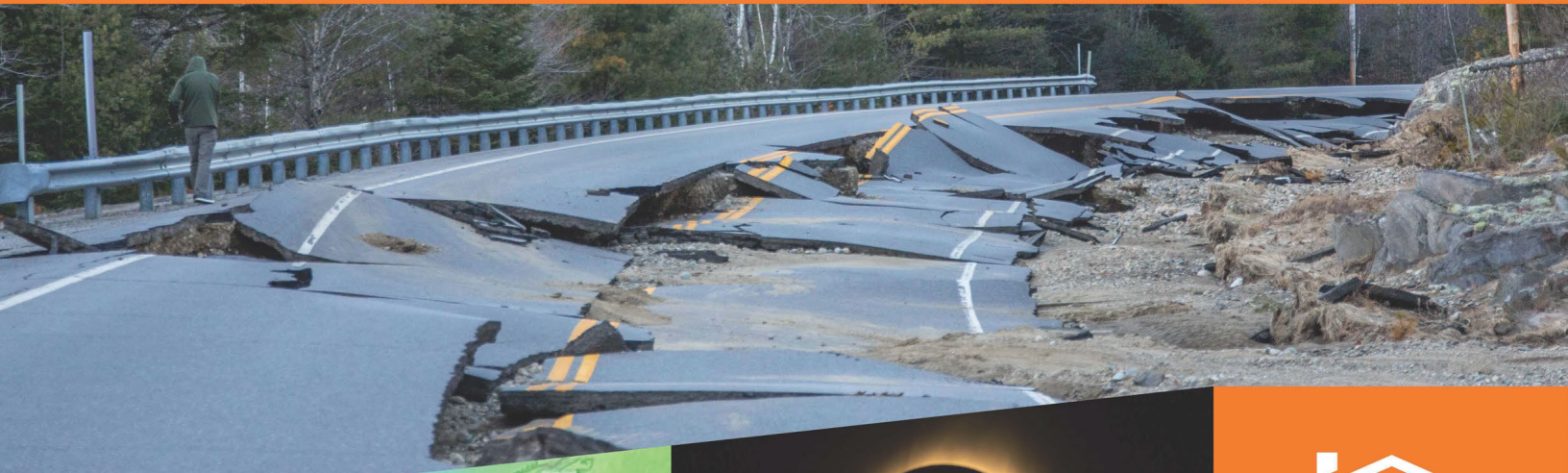

Dear Participant:

Welcome to the Maine Partners in Emergency Preparedness Conference. Though the demanding year of disaster response and recovery fully occupied our time in 2023, I'm thrilled to see so many returning and new participants for this year's event. It has been an extremely busy couple of years for many of us and we have a lot to talk about.

Since we last met in 2022, our emergency preparedness community has contended with numerous hazards and threats, including several significant weather events and a tragic mass casualty incident. Between December 18th, 2023, and January 13th, 2024, Maine experienced three devastating storms – with estimated damages exceeding \$90 million. Looking across 2023/2024, Maine has had at least three other disasters and a hurricane that narrowly missed the state. Finally, on October 25th, 2023, an assailant carried out a mass shooting in Lewiston, resulting in the death of 18 individuals and injuries to 13 others. In remembrance of those who tragically lost their lives on October 25th, and for those families and friends grieving their loss, we dedicate this conference program.

The theme for this year's conference, "Enhancing Preparedness and Community Resilience", pays homage to the resilience of Maine's citizens while offering multiple tracks that guide participants towards knowledge that will increase their preparedness for the disasters they will face. While this conference offers us the opportunity to celebrate the accomplishments of Maine communities in submitting nearly \$64 million in mitigation project and planning grant applications since the convening of our 2022 conference (\$12.6 million in awards to date), we know from these most recent disasters that there is clearly a lot of work to be done. Finally, our keynote speaker, Chris Scott, will provide what is sure to be a valuable perspective on the psychology of command and operating in high pressure environments.

As we have learned over the last two years, there is no limit to our ability to prevail during a disaster when we work together. It is our shared responsibility to collaborate, coordinate, facilitate, and resource the needs of Maine communities who are on the frontlines protecting Mainers in the face of great danger. Thank you for being here today and for all you do in pursuit of a Ready & Resilient Maine.

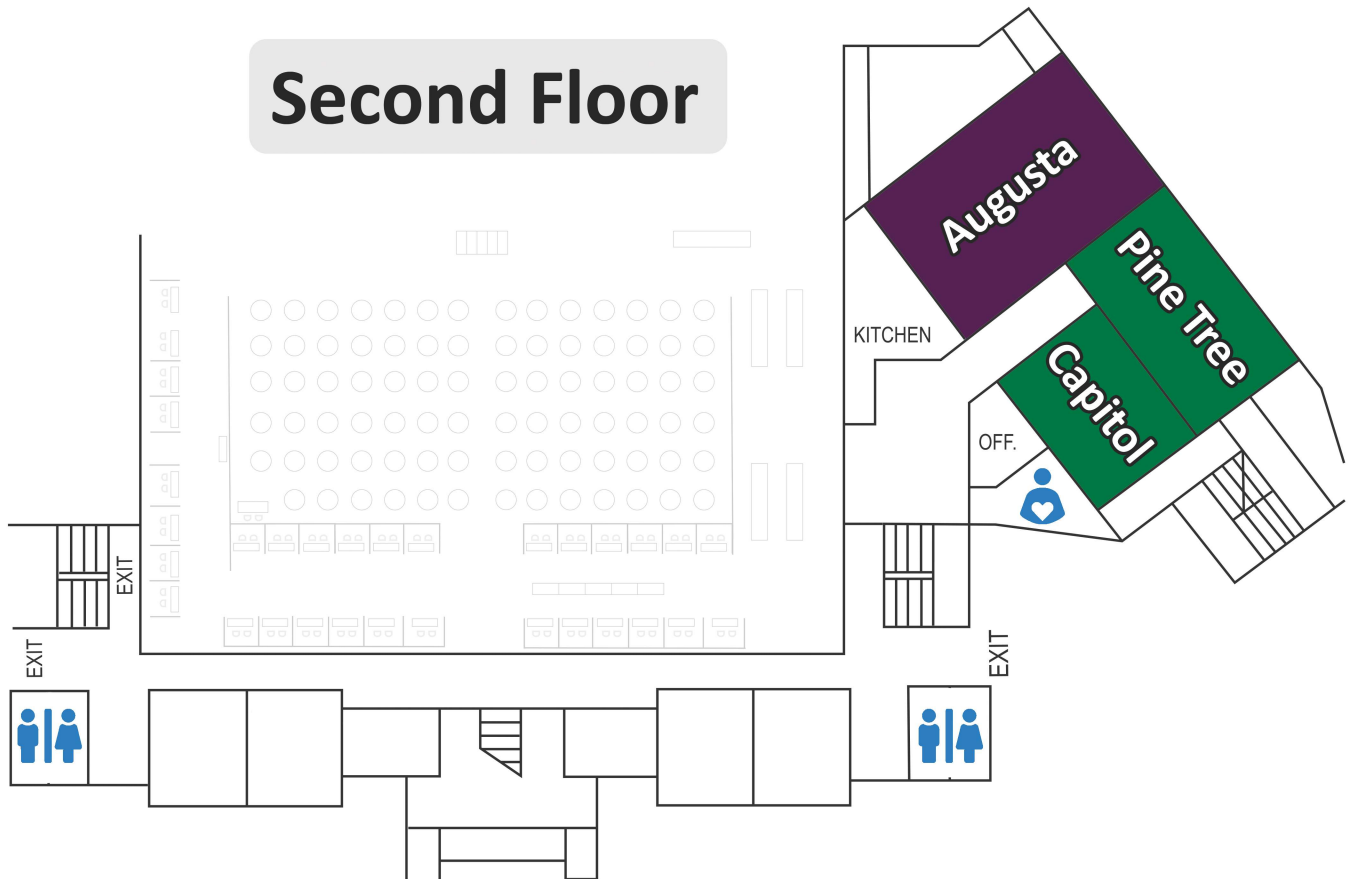

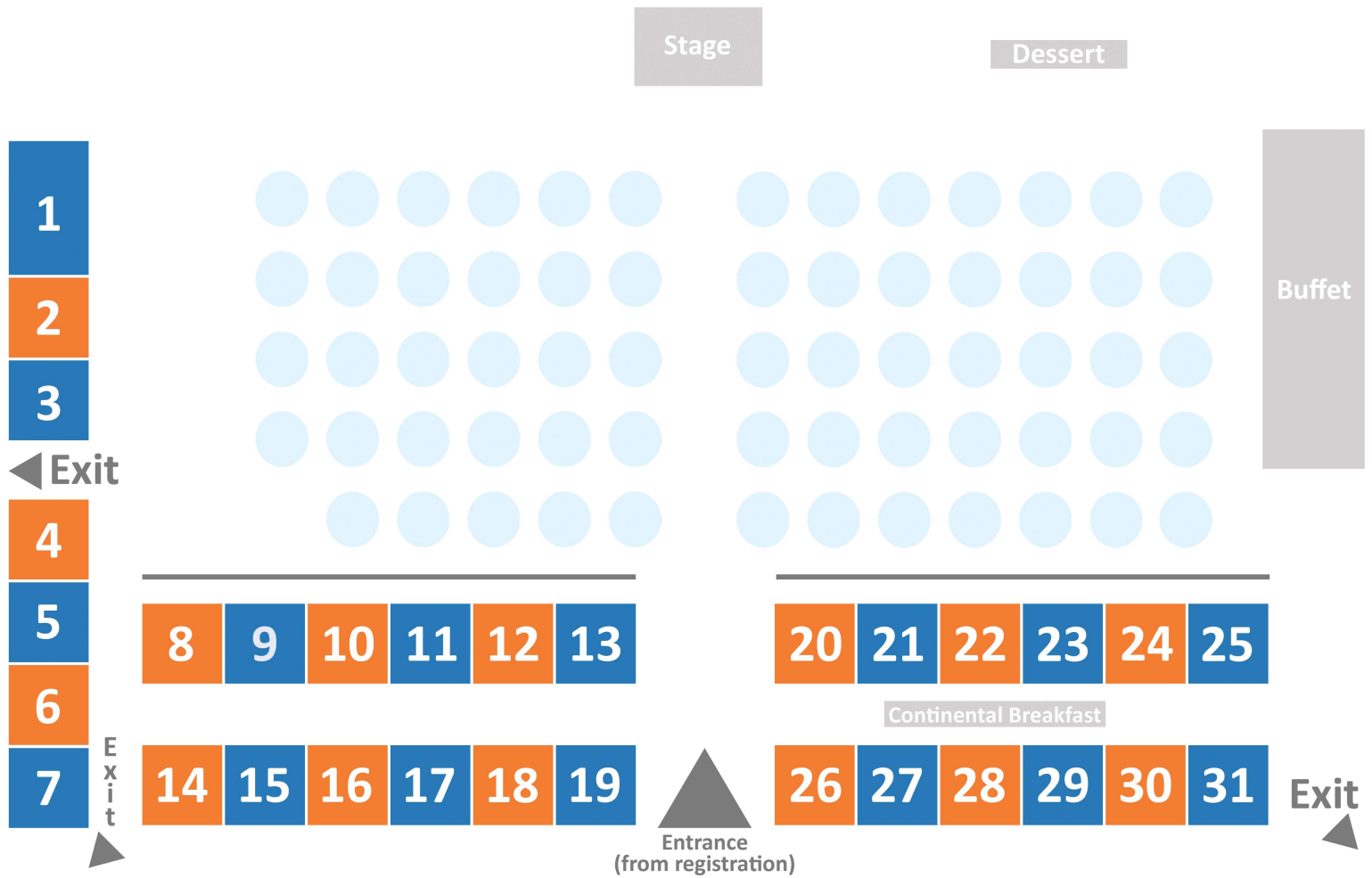

Chris is a thought leader and pioneer in the field of operating in high pressure environments. A dynamic and engaging instructor of all crisis and emergency response related matters. He has an MSc in crisis management and emergency planning, supported by a BSc in Leadership and Management.

Chris's skillset was honed with a 23-year career in the UK Military and has engaged in special operations around the world. His management expertise is underpinned by unique qualifications as an instructor of Human Intelligence (HUMINT), a skillset in understanding how people think, act and feel in high pressure, demanding situations. This helps Chris to create and develop true, bespoke management offerings to our clients.

Chris has studied and written a number of white papers, delivered webinars and seminars on the importance of non-technical skillsets which underpin an individual's ability to deal with crisis and high- pressure situations.

Mastering Decision-Making Under Pressure

Emergency Response and Incident Command is a skill, it is stressful by default and places our brains under significant cognitive strain. Have you ever considered whether you are good at it? Do some people seem to excel at it whilst others seem to continually struggle? Have you ever wondered what lies beneath the surface of a perceived calm exterior. Are humans even capable of being good at it at all? Ultimately, we intend to explore why stress can hamper, hinder and hijack our ability to make effective decisions when we need it most, when we're faced with potentially lifesaving complexities. I look forward to working with attendees of the Maine Preparedness conference to explore, unpick and discuss how stress and pressure affects our decision-making capacity and capabilities. The presentation will explore key pitfalls and solutions to cope with the pressure and mitigate its impacts.

Megan Arsenault is the Deputy Director of York County Emergency Management Agency (YCEMA), where she oversees staffing and operations, serves as the Public Information Officer, and manages social media. During her time at YCEMA, Megan has also served as the Emergency Planning and Preparedness Manager, County Animal Response Team Chief, and Unified Commander for the COVID-19 pandemic response where a focus was directing outreach and engagement efforts. Megan is a Licensed Master Social Worker, a member of IAEM, and holds her CEM-ME.

Secretary Shenna Bellows

Maine's 50th Secretary of State, sworn in on Jan. 4, 2021. Secretary Bellows is Maine's first female Secretary of State. Secretary Bellows serves on the National Association of Secretaries of State (NASS); Elections; Cybersecurity; State Records and Archives; Business Services; and International Relations Committees. She was a member of the bipartisan 2021 NASS Task Force on Vote Verification. She serves as Secretary on the Elections Infrastructure Information Sharing & Analysis Center (EI-ISAC) Executive Committee and is a member of the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency's Election Infrastructure Subsector Government Coordinating Council.

Shalissa Coutoulakis

Shalissa is a leader of the Interagency Recovery Coordination (IRC) Unit, which incorporates the Community Assistance Recovery Support Function (CA RSF), within the Recovery Division for FEMA Region 1. She joined FEMA in November 2021, and was previously a Recovery Coordinator for Rhode Island; With a Masters in Macro-Social Work and a background in Emergency Management, she brings a diverse skillset in support of resilient Recovery.

Heather Dumais

Heather is the State Hazard Mitigation Officer/Grant Management Specialist at Maine Emergency Management Agency. Heather joined MEMA January of 2021 after moving back to her home state of Maine. She spent over 20 years working in the air quality, climate change, and environmental education fields for the National Park Service and US Army Corps of Engineers as a Natural Resource Specialist/US Park Ranger. He currently works full time as the Commander of the 11th Weapons of Mass Destruction Civil Support Team. His duties include management of response to natural and man-made disasters within the state and region, and coordinating his units actions with local, state, and federal emergency response agencies.. He received a Bachelor of Science degree in Biochemistry from the University Of New Hampshire, as well as a Masters degree in Emergency Management and Homeland Security from Arizona State University. Lieutenant Colonel Hepburn currently lives in Belgrade with his wife and two children.

Lauren Jakub has been the Chemical Terrorism Coordinator for the Laboratory Response Network (LRN) at the Maine CDC for the past three years. Lynn joined FEMA in 2019 and holds a Masters in International Relations. Her prior experience in global development with UNICEF and crisis response work with the Red Cross informs her efforts in supporting FEMA's Recovery mission.

Regina (Gina) Marotto first came to FEMA Region I in 2015 as a contractor in the Planning Branch supporting development of regional plans, and soon accepted a leadership position providing long-term recovery support to disasters in West Virginia, Nevada, Florida, and throughout New England. She then took a position supporting long-term recovery and interagency recovery coordination efforts. Gina supported the region's COVID-19 response and recovery, supporting 10 federally recognized Tribal Nations through the novel disaster, and has since become the region's first full-time, dedicated Tribal FEMA Integration Team (FIT) Lead and Tribal Liaison, her current position.

Sam Michaud

Sam Michaud is director of facilities and safety at Good Shepard Food Bank and is President of the Maine VOAD (Volunteers Organized Active in Disaster) board of directors.

Kent Nelson

Kent began working for the Maine Forest Service as a Forest Ranger in 2001. After working in the field four years, he was promoted to Forest Ranger Specialist and now works at the state headquarters in Augusta. At that time, his responsibilities changed from fire suppression and investigation to wildfire prevention and mitigation. He also became Maine's Firewise Liaison and initiated nine nationally recognized Firewise USA sites in Maine. In 2021, he received the prestigious Silver Smokey Bear award for his wildfire prevention efforts. He is a nationally qualified Public Information Officer, Maine Licensed Professional Forester and Fire Prevention Education Team Member. He enjoys working with the public on prescribed fires in Maine and continues to mobilize annually on large western wildfires.

Al Nygren

Al Nygren has been President and Lead Instructor at Training Technologies International, Inc. since 1995. He also serves on the Waterville Fire Department B Shift.

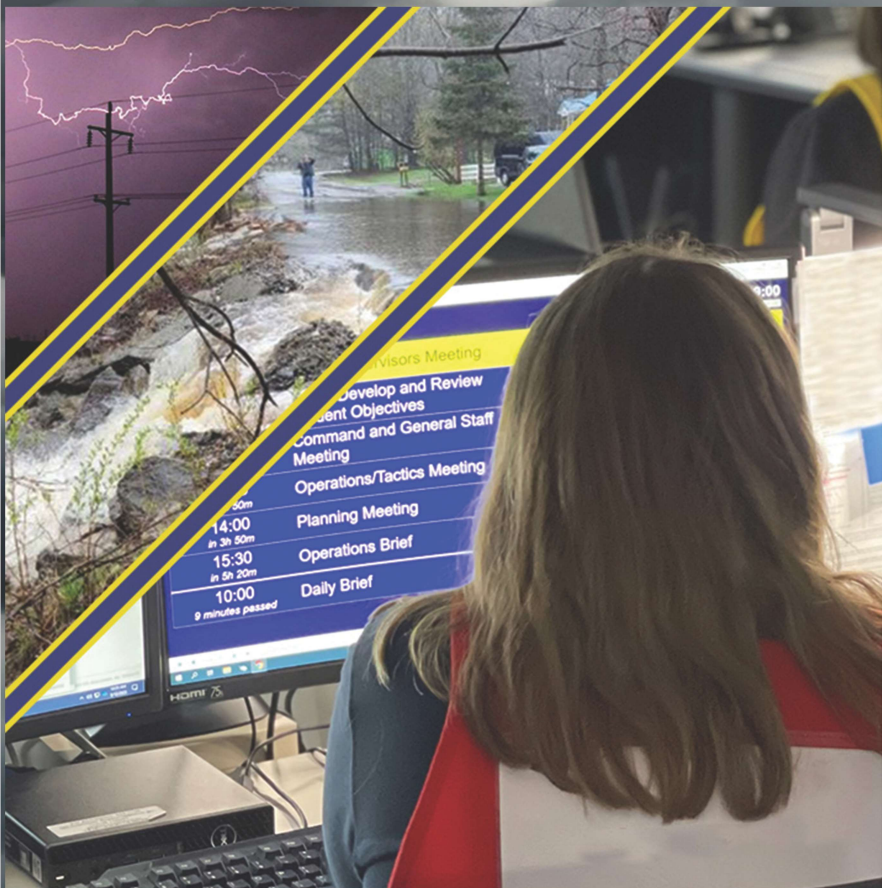

Maine Declared Disaster Updates

Did you know that between 1970 and the present, Maine averaged one disaster declaration per year but that we're starting to see an uptick in both the frequency and intensity of disaster events? Were you aware that disaster recovery can range from a few months to years (think ~6 years) before each event can be closed out? Did you know that as of April 2024, Maine's Recovery team is managing an impressive ten open disasters plus one emergency declaration, and that our two most recent disasters were of such a severe magnitude that even Individual Assistance was granted to assist disaster survivors with home damages? The last time the President granted Individual Assistance to Maine was in 2008.



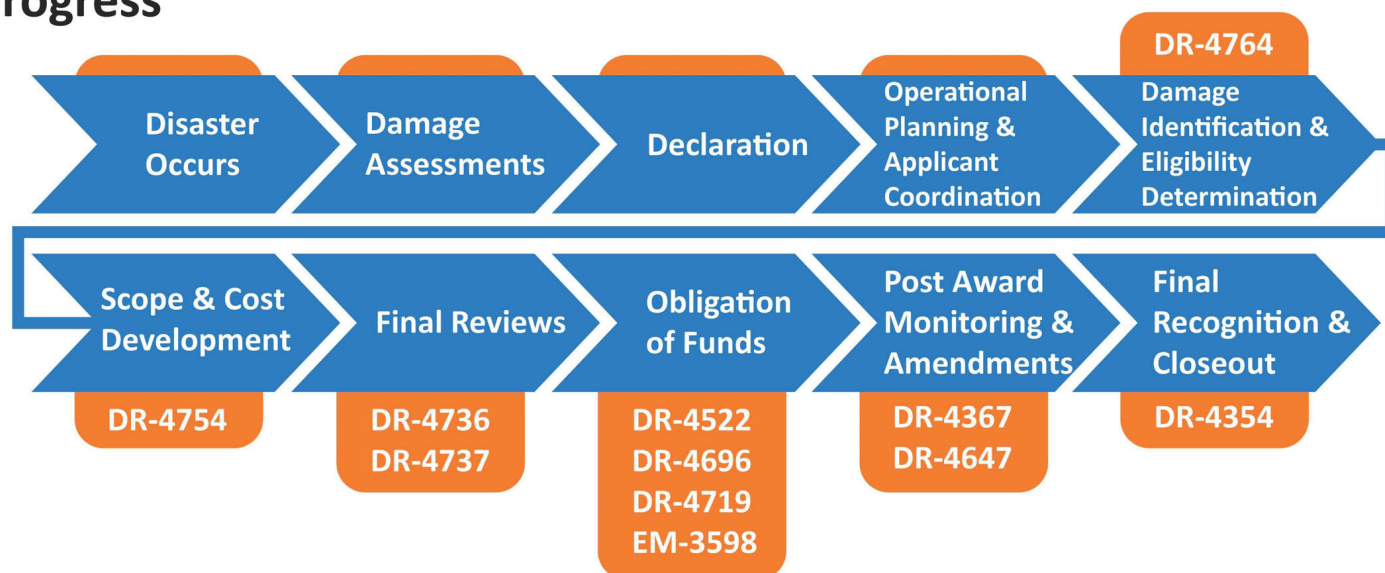

Massive kudos goes out to our incredible Recovery Team. Declaration after declaration after declaration, this team has showed up and delivered every time. Also, a massive thanks to all of the locals that have worked so diligently to meet tight deadlines associated with the submission of Public Infrastructure Initial Damage Assessments, the submission of what can seem like copious amounts of documentation before and after each declaration, and for the sharing of information to their constituents on how to submit damages to homes and businesses. Disaster recovery is a highly collaborative and complex process that simply would not be possible without the partnership of all of you. We thank you!
