OFFICE OPERATIONS UPDATES

UPDATE ON ADMINISTRATIVE ITEMS

Budget

- OAHC initiative was included in the change package passed by the legislature
 - "All other" funding increase of \$146,003 most of which is budgeted for analytics contracts, fellowship compensation, and fees necessary to access legal counsel through the Office of the Attorney General.
 - Changes staffing authorization from an Office Specialist II position to a Planner II position.
- Hiring
 - Still awaiting FJA approval for Public Service Coordinator II to serve in a senior analyst role
 - Planning to post fall fellowship opportunities in early September, pending confirmation of temporary staffing delivery order.
- Website
 - Currently under development, should be live in September
 - URL will be Maine.gov/OAHC

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Updates since last Advisory Council meeting:

- LD 1792 Rural health task force <u>carried over from the special appropriations table.</u>
- LD 1795 Facility fee task force <u>enacted.</u>
- LD 329 Blue Ribbon Commission on Guaranteed Health Care <u>died on the special study table</u>.

Outcomes previously discussed:

- LD 914 Added a reference to considering the cost of new and emerging technologies in the office's work. (passed to be enacted)
- LD 1856 A resolution which clarifies the office's policy option study requirement. It would prioritize a study of public options models for delivery in January of 2024, and provide flexibility on the timeline of delivery of a report on other policy models, which would be required by January 2025. (passed final)

FALL SPECIAL MEETINGS PLANNING

SEPTEMBER PUBLIC HEARING

- From statute: "Beginning in 2023, the office shall convene an annual public hearing no later than October 1st on cost trends and barriers to health care affordability. The hearing must provide an opportunity for public comment on health care cost trends and, beginning in 2023, on barriers to health care affordability. The executive director shall preside over the hearing."
- Hearing to be scheduled for Wednesday, September 27th at 9:00am.
- OAHC will present on health spending, with a focus on MHDO baseline report and recent survey data on barriers to care faced by Maine consumers. Following the presentation, the public will be invited to speak.
 - The public will be invited to testify in person and/or to submit written testimony. (There will not be an option for live remote testimony).
 - The hearing will be available to view remotely, and recorded.
 - A time limit for comments will be established based on the number of individuals who sign up to testify.
 - Commenters will be strongly encouraged to utilize the structured format for their comments, but are not required to.
- Questions for the group:
 - Recommendations regarding the structure of the meeting?
 - Feedback on proposed comment solicitation format?

NOVEMBER CONVENING

- Targeting a full-day in-person gathering in Portland the week of November 13^{th.}
- Proposed invited participants: members of the Council, members of the HCIFS and HHS committees of the legislature, and select representatives of the executive branch (Governor's Office, Bureau of Insurance, State Employee Health Plan, and Department of Health and Human Services).
- Goal: provide a forum for designated stakeholders of OAHC to learn about relevant work on health care affordability around the country, with a specific focus on hearing from other states.
 - Looking to review a variety of "big ideas" from around the country. Will not be possible to provide a comprehensive review of all policy ideas, but looking to present a cross-section of significant activities.
 - Inclusion of policies from other states on the agenda is not an endorsement. This is an opportunity to hear about why states pursued the strategies they did, and generate food for thought.
 - Attendees will be asked to review provided reading materials before the event, so that panelists do not need to spend time summarizing initiatives.
